Mutual aid response showcases power of teamwork

fter strong thunderstorms downed trees and power lines in July, Wisconsin's public power community rallied together to restore service. Beginning late Friday, July 19, MEUW helped to coordinate mutual aid assistance in Barron, Gresham, Kaukauna and Wisconsin Rapids. Crews from 44 member utilities traveled north to assist with power restoration and clean up. Some 10,000 customers lost electric service in Wisconsin Rapids, where more than 100 utility poles needed to be replaced.

Virtually all available resources from public power utilities across the state were used for this mutual aid event, which is believed to be among the largest in-state event MEUW has helped to coordinate. Some utilities that received mutual aid and restored power over the weekend turned around and sent crews to help in Wisconsin Rapids, where it took eight days before power was fully restored.
